The College

SHOREDITCH COLLEGE is a constituent College of the University of London Institute of Education and is conducted by the Inner London Education Authority under the Regulations of the Department of Education and Science.

The College occupies an estate of some 65 acres on Cooper's Hill, Englefield Green, Egham, in the County of Surrey, and overlooks the Thames at Runnymede. It is about 250 yards from the bus route between Staines and Windsor and is within easy access of London.

The College is for men students. There is residential accommodation for some 440 students. There are also Day students. Resident students are required to spend part of their period of training in approved College lodgings.

Conditions of Admission

Applicants for admission must

- 1. have reached the age of 18 years by 1st October in the year of admission to College. The Session opens in September.
- 2. satisfy the Department of Education and Science as to their physical fitness, nationality and residence in the United Kingdom.
- 3. have obtained a School Certificate or a General Certificate (or Certificates) of Education with passes in
 - (a) five subjects at the Ordinary level, or
 - (b) three subjects at the Ordinary level and one other subject at the Advanced level, or
 - (c) two subjects at the Ordinary level and two other subjects at the Advanced level, or
 - (d) three subjects at the Advanced level, provided that there is evidence that other courses have been studied beyond the age of 16.

Passes in the Certificate of Secondary Education at Grade I are regarded as equivalent to passes in the General Certificate of Education at Ordinary level. It is expected that applicants will attain a satisfactory standard in English Language before admission.

Applicants who are not qualified in accordance with the above requirements may be considered for Special Entry. They should normally be over 21 years of age.

Applications for this College must be made on forms obtainable from the College and these should be returned to the Principal as soon as possible after 8th October.

Fees and Grants

A student who is a British subject ordinarily resident in England or Wales will normally be 'recognised' for the purpose of fees and grants. All 'recognised' students receive free tuition and, according to their own and their parents' income (or their own income only if they are regarded as 'independent'), they may receive maintenance grants towards the cost of training.

Details of grants available and how the amounts are assessed, are set out in Form 101 R.T.C. which accompanies this booklet. If necessary, further advice about training grants can be obtained from your local education authority.

Resident students who are 'recognised' receive free board and lodging but if their income (or parents' income as the case may be) is such that they receive no grant, they can be required to contribute towards their board and lodging up to the full annual cost. This is at present £260.

All 'recognised' students whether claiming grant or not, must complete the appropriate grant form and send it to their local education authority. If no grant is claimed the income details may be omitted.

Students who are not 'recognised' are required to pay the full tuition fee which is £320 a year, plus the full cost of board and lodging if resident.

The charges quoted for the full annual cost of board and lodging and tuition fees are those prevailing at the time of printing and they are subject to review.

Courses of Study

The College provides

- 1. INITIAL TRAINING COURSES for teaching, extending over three years. At the discretion of the University of London Institute of Education applicants with suitable experience and qualifications may be considered for shortened courses of initial training.
- 2. INITIAL TRAINING COURSES for teaching, extending over one year, for men with any of the following preliminary qualifications:
 - (a) Full Technological Certificate, or Higher National Certificate, or Higher National Diploma.
 - (b) Part I and Section I of Part II of the Handicraft Teachers' Certificate Examination of the City and Guilds of London Institute.

Applicants should normally have reached the age of 25, but in exceptional circumstances, and at the discretion of the Institute of Education other candidates may be admitted.

- 3. (a) A SUPPLEMENTARY COURSE in Handicraft, for which qualified teachers are eligible to apply, and extending over one year.
 - (b) A SUPPLEMENTARY COURSE in Technical Drawing for which qualified teachers are eligible to apply, and extending over one term.

THESE SUPPLEMENTARY COURSES are recognised by the Department of Education and Science. Qualified teachers may be seconded by their employing Local Education Authorities on full salary. No charge will be made for tuition but they will be responsible for their maintenance. Residence in College rooms is not normally available. Applications for admission in September 1968 should be made to the Principal not later than 1st April 1968.

4. A course leading to the DIPLOMA IN HANDICRAFT EDUCATION of the University of London Institute of Education, for which qualified teachers are eligible to apply, and extending over one year.

This course is intended for qualified teachers with at least five years' teaching experience. The preliminary qualification is the Teacher's Certificate or Certificate in Education, with Handicraft as a Main Course subject, or such other qualifications in Handicraft of equivalent merit as may be recognised by the Institute of Education.

All students taking Initial Training Courses are required to study the following:

- (a) Handicraft as a Specialist Main Course,
- (b) The Principles and Practice of Education, with special reference to Secondary Education,
- (c) One of the following subjects as a second Main Course:

 Art, Divinity, Drama, English Language and Literature,
 Geography, History, Mathematics, Music, Physical
 Education, Rural Biology and Natural History, Rural
 Studies, Science, Social Studies and Youth Work.
- (d) The following curriculum courses:
 English, Craft History, Mathematics, Technical Drawing, Physical Education.
- (e) Basic Courses in Principles of Design and Science Technology.

All academic courses are approved by the University of London Institute of Education as the official Examining body. The College is required to certify that a student has satisfactorily completed his Courses before he is permitted to enter as a candidate for the Teacher's Certificate Examination. The Teacher's Certificate, subject to the statutory regulations of the University of London, is regarded as Part I of the Course leading to the Award of the B.Ed. degree.

General Information

The College has some twenty extensively equipped workshops for the practice of a wide variety of wood and metal and related crafts. The library has a stock of some 30,000 items of general and professional interest including specialist literature concerned with Handicraft. There is a large collection of visual equipment and materials, together with school textbooks, and over 100 current English and foreign periodicals are displayed.

Students' Union

The Students' Union is affiliated to the National Union of Students and to the University of London Institute of Education Students' Association. The Officers are elected by the students of the College and all student activities representing a wide range of social, recreational and cultural interests are autonomously the responsibility of the Union.
